The Bimodal Narrative Approach: Delivering Extensive Reading and Listening Experiences to the EFL Classroom

The Bimodal Narrative Approach (BNA) is an approach in development that integrates principles and materials from Extensive Listening and Extensive Reading (ER) with teacher-led and -facilitated skills practice. In East Asian contexts, ER is underutilized in language programs due to its incompatibility with the local teacher-centered norms of education. BNA bridges the gap between traditional and recent perspectives on language learning by moving learners gradually toward an ER experience, linking pedagogic and authentic materials, and providing a rich multi-modal learning experience. The approach was developed for an in-service regional teacher training program at Chonnam National University and was well received by trainee teachers. Participating teachers have subsequently begun to employ the approach in their own high school classrooms. A detailed discussion of BNA will be given with sample activities and an example of how the approach was applied to the graded reader *Billy Elliot*, incorporating its accompanying audio CD and clips from the feature film.
