Getting There

The Seoul-Kyonggi-do Conference will be held at Sungkyunkwan University in Seoul. To get there by subway, take the blue line to Hyeohwa Station. Leave via exit 1 and walk about 1 minute to the green Sungkyunkwan (SKK) shuttle bus stop. The bus stop sign is green and says Sungkyunkwan shuttle bus in Korean only. If you pass Bennigan's, you have walked too far. The shuttlebus will be running between the subway station and the university between 8:30 AM and 12:00 PM only.

Once on campus, take the shuttle bus past the main gate and up the hill on the left side of the athletic field. The bus will stop next to a construction site facing a big white building (the business building) on the top of a hill. Behind the white building is a red brick building. The best way to access this is to take a road on the right side of the white building (when you are facing the building).

Once in the red brick building, look on the directory for the TESOL department on the fifth floor. Some of the presentations will be here.
